### THANKSGIVING 2019

For those of us so privileged to live in the United States of America, Thanksgiving Day is a unique and appropriate national holiday. As the day established for this country's expression of gratitude to God, it is one holiday that our market economy has not yet learned how to exploit. There are few Thanksgiving gifts. Decorations are minimal. We find entertainment between televised parades and football games. But, for the most part, Thanksgiving is a quiet day enjoyed with family and closest friends.

The Pilgrims offered thanks not arbitrarily, but specifically to God; for health, for food, for friendships, for safety, for survival, for the protection, provision and the blessings of life together in its trials and triumphs. One hundred and two members of the English Separatist Church, a splinter group of the Church of England, left England seeking religious freedom in America. The Mayflower set sail on September 6, 1620. Sixty days later they landed in Plymouth Harbor. The voyage was long, and the subsequent cold New England winter was harsh. Every family lost someone: infants died; the elderly died; husbands lost wives; wives lost husbands; parents lost children; children lost parents to hunger, dysentery, disease, and the elements. Thanks to friendly natives, crops were planted, fertilized, and somehow grew. At the very edge of disaster, with every heart having been broken over the loss of a dear one, and following a good fall harvest, they made provision for a day that offered thanks to God. The seeds of Thanksgiving as a day of communally expressed gratitude to God began to take root.

From George Washington to Donald Trump, each United States President has issued his individual proclamation signifying a Day of National Thanksgiving in November, encouraging Americans "to assemble in their homes, places of worship, to reinforce ties of family and community, to express our profound thanks to God for the many blessings that Americans enjoy, and to reach out with expressions of gratitude and friendship to one another."

As a community, we will gather at the Chapel on Wednesday, November 27th (Thanksgiving Eve) at 6:30 p.m. The Chapel will host the Palm Beach Interfaith Thanksgiving Service. Since 1972, the Island's Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish faith community has come together to express grateful praise to God for our many bestowed protections and blessed provisions. Clergy representatives of St. Edward Catholic, The Church of Bethesda By-The-Sea, The Paramount Church, and the Royal Poinciana Chapel participate. Rabbi Michael Resnick of Temple Emanu-El of Palm Beach will offer the Thanksgiving message. Music will be offered by Stewart Foster and the Chapel Chorale, along with Temple musicians. A reception will follow in Kirkman Hall.

Put the finishing touches and final preparations on your Thanksgiving Day celebration after we worship together. Come, let us first express as a community, our gratitude for the bounty and blessings, the protections and provisions of our Great God. Blessed are we as a congregation, as families and as individuals. A Happy and Blessed Thanksgiving to you and yours!

To start the Season of Advent, the Chapel Chorale and Chamber Orchestra will present music from Vivaldi's "Gloria" on Sunday, December 1, during the morning Worship Service. This joyful music is beloved by many around the world as perfectly expressing the song of the Angels announcing Christ's birth.

And finally, don't forget to reserve your Handel Messiah tickets (please call 561-845-9696 or find Jack Hughes on a Sunday morning) for the performance by the Palm Beach Masterworks Chorus on Sunday, December 15, at 7 p.m. These tickets sell out quickly because it has become a lovely tradition to hear this music performed by a an 80-voice Choir, professional soloists and full orchestra in the historic Chapel that we all love.

Several weeks ago, Laurel and I spent the weekend in Glen Arbor, Michigan, where I was invited to officiate at the wedding of a young woman who was in a youth group I led more than twelve years ago. It was a wonderful opportunity to see the leaves turn to vibrant shades of red and yellow, and we experienced a few days of the cooler weather October brings to Michigan. More importantly, however, I was absolutely honored that after all these years, she and

her husband to be, wanted me to officiate at their wedding. Moreover, her family is one that I always looked up to and respected. Her father taught Sunday School when I was in high school, and he had been a leader on numerous mission trips that I attended with the Presbyterian Church in Westfield, NJ. It was amazing to be there with them during that special weekend for so many reasons, but foremost among them, was to be there with this family. The thought that my life has somehow left an impact on this young woman is so meaningful and humbling, but that is exactly what her father has done for me. I'm thankful this wedding gave us an opportunity to all be together again.


After the rehearsal dinner on Friday night, Laurel and I braved the cold to walk onto the shores of Lake Michigan. As we were standing there, listening to the waves hit the shore, Laurel told me to look up. Above us, I saw more stars than I think I have ever seen before in my life. The entire sky was filled with stars! The stars directly above felt so incredibly close, closer than I had ever experienced, and there were stars brightly glimmering against the night sky in every direction, as far as I could see. It was as if I could see the dome of the sky as described in the creation account of Genesis 1. Having grown up in the New Jersey suburbs of NYC, where every night you know which direction is East by the light emanating from the city itself (I'm not complaining, I love cities!), I had never seen stars like this. It was amazing! As I was staring up at the sky in wonder, Laurel asked me to imagine what the sky was like when Jesus walked the earth. At this, I became even more amazed. This was certainly a God moment.

It is amazing to think that these stars are always above us, but so often we are unable to see them. Whether it is because we don't take the time to look up, or because our world is literally flooded with earthly light, so often we fail or are unable to see the stars and the beauty of the world around us. To take this a bit further, so often we simply become so busy with our daily lives, so consumed with our routines, and even worry and fears, that we fail to see the gifts and love of God surrounding and sustaining us. We either don't take the time to look up or we are so consumed with life that our perspective is clouded. As the busyness of Thanksgiving and Christmas quickly approaches, I think it is important that we strive to be mindful of God's blessings and sustaining power in our lives. This can take place in big ways, through trips to Michigan, or in the places where you may be traveling to in the coming weeks, but it can also happen right now, in this very place. Perhaps worship, an educational offering, an Advent Prayer Gathering, a concert, or some quiet time in our Sanctuary or gardens can give you the space you need to reconnect with God. Or, maybe a walk on the beach or taking A1A instead of 95 on one of your errands would do some good. In any event, I hope that amid all the busyness of the coming weeks, we remember all we have to be thankful for and let that fill our hearts with gratitude to God.


